The Whale Shark *Rhincodon typus* is the largest fish on earth. It is a large, plankton-feeding, highly migratory shark distributed widely in tropical and warm temperate seas. A proposal to list the species in Appendix II of CITES was defeated in 2000 despite achieving a simple majority in favour largely because of a lack of biological and trade information. In 2001, TRAFFIC East Asia-Taipei carried out market and trade surveys of Whale Shark meat in 14 countries and cities around Taiwan.

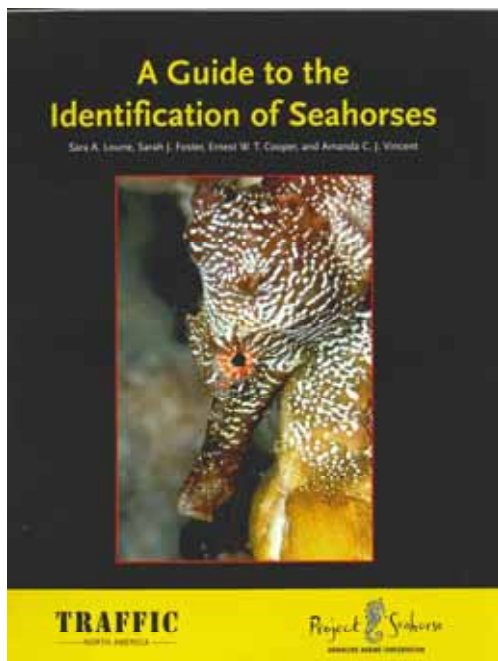

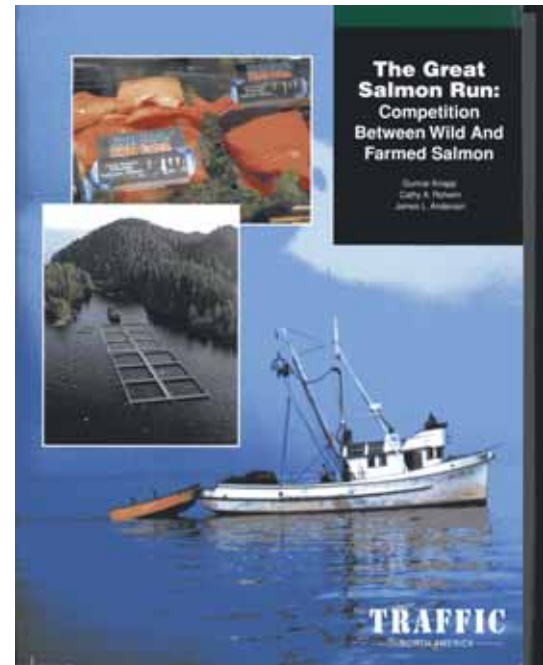
