

INTRODUCTION

Traditional medicine (TM) is one of the oldest health care systems and is a major culture-bound method of healing in developing countries, particularly in Africa. TM involves the use of a wide range of flora and fauna products, the demand for which has continued to grow rapidly in recent years. The use of fauna products in TMs has received less attention than flora, yet the trade is extensive, not well understood or regulated. Many of the fauna species used in TM are protected, thus their harvest for TM has become a major conservation concern. In Tanzania, the scale and severity

of wildlife harvested and traded for TM is under-appreciated, unregulated, and not seen as a priority by law enforcement in Tanzania. This assessment provides an overview of the wildlife products used and species extracted for the TM trade. To identify the diversity of wildlife species in local TMs, the assessment was guided by the following questions (1) What wildlife species are sold in the TM shops in Dar es Salaam, Tanga and Unguja (2) What health values are attached to these species/wildlife products? Recommendations for improved regulation of the TM trade in Tanzania are provided.

SOURCING AND SALE

Wildlife products of protected species were highly concealed and

sold undercover to known customers

The trade chain involves hunters/harvesters, middlemen, shop vendors, traditional healers, and both local and international final consumers/ users. Interviews revealed that most of the TM products are supplied by Hunters/Harvesters (95%, n=75), and from other vendors (5%, n=4).

Wildlife for TM use was sourced from the rural areas of Pangani, Saadani, Arusha and Handeni for Tanga; Kilwa, Mahenge and Selous game reserve for Dar es Salaam; and for Unguja the products were sourced from Tanga, Mombasa and all over Unguja Island.

CONCLUSIONS

Diversity of wildlife products

A wide range of wildlife derived products were identified as being part of the TM trade in Tanzania.

Illegal harvest of protected species

Many of the wildlife products are from protected species, indicating that illegal harvesting is taking place.

Rampant concealment of products by vendors

The concealment of many wildlife products by the vendors indicates awareness of the illegal nature of the products being sold.

TM trade regulation is low or absent

Regulation of wildlife products in the TM trade is low or absent and not a priority for law enforcement.



RECOMMENDATIONS

ALERT WILDLIFE AUTHORITIES TO TM TRADE

Tanzania Wildlife Authority (TAWA) needs to be alerted to the high number of protected species being sold for the TM trade.

CARRY OUT REGULAR MONITORING

Tanzania Wildlife Authority (TAWA), and the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries are encouraged to carry out regular monitoring of the TM trading shops.

ALERT TMDA TO IMPACT OF UNSUSTAINABLE TRADE

The Tanzania Medicines and Medical Devices Authority (TMDA) is to be made aware of protected species being traded for TM and the potential impact of unsustainable levels of harvesting of these species

ENGAGE WITH TM VENDORS

Tanzania Wildlife Authority and the Tanzania Medicines and Medical Devices Authority are encouraged to collaborate and engage with TM vendors to discuss sustainable and legal ways of obtaining wildlife products
